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Mayor Coppola, City Council Members, and Community Members,

I am pleased to present to you the 2010 Port Orchard Police Department Annual Report.

Violent crime has continued to drop in our city. In 2010 we saw an additional 4% drop and per capita we dropped from 5.0 violent crimes per thousand people to 4.6 per thousand. As expected we saw an increase in the total number of property crimes, up 5% from 2009, and per capita we went from 54.2 property crimes per thousand people to 54.3 per thousand. However, that seemingly was the trend statewide, as even though we saw an increase we still dropped lower on the rankings from 29th in the state to 32nd in the state. More detailed information about this is included in the following pages of the report.

As our city has grown, so have our calls for police service. Up almost 20% from 2009, we hit an all time record. Some of this is citizen generated, some is business generated, and some of it is proactively generated by our officers. Obviously these calls have increased at a significantly higher percentage than the increase in the number of officers. As such, we will continue to find innovative ways to help reduce repeat calls to locations, through problem oriented policing concepts.

Even as our resources become stretched, the feedback from our customers is positive. We continue to maintain an A+ rating in all categories except for "If follow-up was necessary, was the officer readily available". In this category, more than 50% said "no". I suspect that this is related to a reduction in an officer's available time, but we will continue to monitor this and find ways to make improvements. In addition, our customers surveyed feel the safest they ever have in their home and in their neighborhoods.

As we move forward with additional annexations, I am confident we are prepared as an agency to deal with the additional growth. Early in 2011, we added one additional police officer to our authorized strength, boosting our number to 22 commissioned employees. As an agency we are prepared to add additional officers as those annexations come to fruition. In the mean time, we continue to work within conservative budget numbers, finding new and exciting ways to be more productive and efficient, ensuring the best stewardship of our community's tax dollars while providing the highest levels of service.


POLICE CALLS FOR SERVICE








COMMISSIONED POLICE OFFICERS


